Maintenance & complaints

As a management committee we are working hard to overcome the challenges tenants face when reporting repairs and in the last year we have been able to bring many longstanding maintenance issues to a close.

As a member of this housing cooperative, you are more than just a resident, you are a co-owner. Choosing to use a "no win, no fee" lawyer might seem like a way to finally get leverage, but it is often the most damaging path for both you and your neighbours. These firms typically take a massive cut of any settlement, meaning you receive significantly less than you deserve, while the cooperative's shared funds, money meant for repairs, improvements, and community projects are drained by high legal fees. Because we are a mutual organisation, there is no external "corporate" pot of money; every pound paid to a lawyer is a pound taken directly out of our collective budget. By using our free internal complaints process you can escalate your concerns while keeping our resources where they belong, invested in our Co-op.

Rotting windows and condensation



The recent stock condition survey highlighted the poor state of window frames in some of our properties so the MC is looking to address this with a future upgrade of windows in urgent need of repair. Excessive condensation is one of the main contributors to rotting frames so in the meantime please help us to slow down the damage to windows by following these easy steps to reduce condensation.

Preventing condensation

- Produce as little moist air as possible — for example, by drying clothes outside and keeping lids on pans.
- If it's not possible to dry laundry outside, use the spin cycle on the washing machine twice to reduce the amount of water held in the fabric.
- Try to allow at least 30 minutes a day with the windows open a crack to allow for air flow and improved ventilation.
- Make sure any moist air you create can leave your home through vents, extractor fans and open windows/doors. Dehumidifiers and moisture absorbers can really help.
